<p>Monday 29th June</p>	<p>Share the story book 'What the Ladybird Heard' by Julia Donaldson Here is a link of the author sharing the story: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=abKadke35cs&feature=youtu.be or https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Eu9mPX7DuLA Write a list of rhyming words used throughout the story. Can you think of any more rhyming words?</p>	<p>Draw out sets of dots on squares of paper or post it notes. Make these look like the patterns on a dice from a game. Lay these out on the floor in spaces. Hide up to 6 small items like dried beans or smarties (of the same colour) under a cup or a plant pot. You will then need something to swat with-a fly swatter or a plastic egg flipper or spoon! Get your child to come near to the plant pot/cup and close their eyes. Grown ups hide 1-6 beans. Open your eyes. Lift off the plant pot. Children it's your job to swat the correct number of spots as quickly as you can! Repeat with different amounts under the pot. This game is more about instantly recognising numbers rather than counting - this is called subitising.</p>	<p>Can you make a trap to help the police catch baddies? How does your trap work?</p>
<p>Tuesday 30th June</p>	<p>Discuss what an adjective is. 'An adjective is a describing word'. Look at adjectives that describe each animal in the story. How many other adjectives can you think of to describe them? Use the animal posters and write adjectives on them or you can draw your own farm animals and write adjectives to describe them.</p>	<p>Today you will need to try and remember a rhyme! It will help you to say your odd and even numbers. Maybe a grown up could write it out for you and stick it around the house! "I'm an odd number and my name is Bod. I like numbers when they're odd. All odd numbers taste just fine when they end in 1, 3, 5, 7, 9. I'm an even number and my name is Steven. I like numbers when they're even. All even numbers taste just great and they end in 0, 2, 4, 6, 8." Remember if the number is 'Even', there will be an equal number of spots on each side. If the number is 'Odd', the number of spots on each side will not be equal.</p>

You could use a paper plate, junk modelling, paint, pencils or paper...</p>

Thinking carefully about the capital letters and full stops. Afterwards, see if you can write the sentence in your best handwriting. You might want to practise the letters that are tricky, like the 's' or 'a'.</p>	<p>Make Ladybird biscuits- digestives with red icing and raisins or choc chips Simply decorate your biscuits with as many spots as you want and then talk about how many you have put on each side of the ladybird! How many spots altogether? Set a challenge of each biscuit having to have 5 or 10 spots. How many on one side, how many on the other? Talk about the calculation on both sides of the biscuit to make 10. Another way! Each ladybird must have the same amount of spots on each side. How many different doubles have you got? What do these make?</p>	<p>Play "The Farmers in the Den", "Duck, Duck, Goose" or/and "Musical statues".</p>

<p>Friday 3rd July</p>	<p>Speedily read and write tricky words (phase 2 or 3 decide which set is more appropriate for your child).</p> <p>Phase 2 tricky words (I, no, go, the, to, into).</p> <p>Phase 3 tricky words (he, she, we, me, be, my, was, her, you, are, all, they)</p> <p>Play a snap game with these words.</p>	<p>Please have some fun practising your number formation today! The teachers would love to see how creative you can be.</p>  <p>The little girl in the picture is painting over chalks with water. Have a go at writing in paints, rice or even some shaving foam. Make sure that you are forming your numbers correctly.</p>	<p>Listen closely to the story. What does the ladybird hear? There is a ladybird on every page and he/she hears all the goings on in the farmyard and story. Play your own game listening to the world around you. Say the phrase "I hear with my little ear something that sounds like..." Describe that you can hear around you.</p>
